What is the Swansea Water Project?

The Swansea Water Project is an \$8.5 million project resulting from an agreement between the State Government of Tasmania, Glamorgan Spring Bay Council (GSBC) and Hobart Water to provide Swansea with high quality drinking water by late 2009, or possibly earlier, all things going well.

Hobart Water has a dedicated team delivering the project which includes a 400ML storage dam, new pipelines and a treatment plant to treat water to the Australian Drinking Water Guideline standards. Other minor associated works include upgrading the Swan River pump station, a new pump station at Meredith River and installing a roof at the existing Cathcart Street resevoir.

A project steering committee also ensures the project moves forward. The committee comprises Mayor Bertrand Cadart, Council General Manager David Metcalf, Councillor Jan Bacon together with the CEO of Hobart Water, Dr Christine Mucha and Tiziana Botti, Manager Marketing and Community Relations.
